HashimaXR Learning Resource

These prompts can be used for classroom discussion, written reflection, or small group work. Select prompts appropriate to your context and learning objectives.

For Any Session

- What is the difference between a project that fails for technical reasons and one that fails because of political resistance? Why does the distinction matter?
- The project team chose not to release a compromised version of HashimaXR. Was this the right decision? What would have been gained or lost by releasing a version without the critical historical content?
- How do you distinguish between legitimate institutional caution and soft gatekeeping? Is there a bright line, or is it contextual?

On Heritage and Memory

- Who has the authority to define what counts as a site's 'real' history? How is that authority established and contested?
- What is the relationship between heritage tourism and historical accountability? Can they coexist, or are they in tension?
- The UNESCO World Heritage Committee expressed 'strong regret' at Japan's interpretive failures but has no enforcement mechanism. What does this suggest about international heritage governance?

On Digital Media

- Does immersive media have different ethical obligations than other forms of historical representation? Why or why not?
- How might you design an XR experience that makes absence or silence legible to users, rather than filling in all the gaps?
- What would it mean for a digital heritage project to practice 'interpretive accountability'?

On Transferability

- What other contested heritage sites face similar dynamics? What patterns recur?
- How might the 'archive of obstruction' framework apply to cases beyond Hashima — in other countries, other periods, other types of contested history?
- If you were advising a project team beginning work on a contested heritage site, what would you tell them based on this case study?
